Get creative!



Wax seals were used to keep letters closed and it also meant you could recognise who the sender was.

TASK 1: Find out when wax sealing of letters was used in history and if the Fencibles would have used this technique to send their letters?

TASK 2: Create aged looking paper and make your very own wax seal.

What you need

Ageing the paper: 1xTea Bag Warm water Small bowl Cotton wool or tissue Plain white paper For the Seal: Metal thimble or decorative metal button Crayon Candle lighter or heat source.

Making the paper

- 1. Make some strong tea using warm water a in a small bowl.
- Use either the tea bag or a piece of cotton wool /tissue to paint the entire paper (both sides), by either wiping along the paper or making small blotches along the page. It will create different effects, so get creative.
- 3. When the entire page is covered, let it dry in the sun whilst lying flat.
- 4. When completely dry you can start writing your letters. (Why not give our letter writting worksheet ago which will help you to put your letter together correctly)

Making the Seal

- 1. Choose a colour crayon of your choice and take off the wrapping
- 2. Light a candle and as the wax starts to melt, drip the wax onto your paper where you want our wax seal
- 3. Let the wax cool for a few seconds before proceeding with the next step
- 4. Take the thimble or button and push it into the wax puddle and press down for a few seconds, until wax cools slightly.
